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INTRODUCTION and OVERVIEW

The Methow Valley Emergency plan was initially inspired and conceived by local residents and organizations in early 2007 subsequent to several major events that occurred in 2006. Notably, the Tripod Complex Fire, which consumed 175,000 acres of National Forest and State lands, threatened the towns of Winthrop, Twisp, and Mazama, along with severe winter storms, which resulted in power outages affecting the entire valley for extended periods.

Because of these and other events it became apparent that there was a need for better organization and an emergency plan that was localized for the Methow Valley, addressing the particular emergent needs of the people in the valley, especially the special needs population.

The original organizing committee included people and representatives from virtually every sector, including first responders, health care, school, red cross, public health, communications, PUD/Coop, faith based organizations, emergency management, and local citizens. The process was initially facilitated by Okanogan County Emergency Management, and later transitioned over to the local emergency committee, which is tasked with the ongoing development and updating of the plan. It is important to recognize that any emergency plan needs constant attention, recognizing that both information, risks, hazards, and needs change over time, and the plan must be updated accordingly to remain effective and useful. The local committee needs both sufficient participation and the support of the community in order to make this happen.

This plan is a result of initial and ongoing efforts by the people of the Methow Valley. It attempts to provide first a current list of critical resources and contacts locally available in the event of a major emergency affecting part or the entire valley. The purpose of this plan is NOT to replace or conflict with the regular first responder system in the valley, which include Aero Methow Rescue Service, Okanogan County Fire District #6, Twisp Police Department, the Winthrop Marshal's Office and Okanogan County Sheriff's Office. In combination, these agencies effectively handle over 90% of all emergencies in the valley, and do it very well, coordinating with each other every day, as they have done for years.

This plan is meant to supplement the services provided by the professional responders in the event of a major emergency, which could require resources and personnel not normally provided by these providers. Hence, the plan provides a list of those additional personnel, facilities, and organizations that may be brought into service to meet the needs that arise in a major emergency.

Finally, there exists a legal responsibility by local and county government to both have a plan and provide emergency management for the people in the valley. The towns of Winthrop and Twisp are members of the Okanogan County Emergency Council and as such deem it necessary to support the Methow Valley Emergency Plan. The county has in place a Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP), which serves as the master plan for the county. This plan, however, is not "individualized" for any particular geographic area or community. Hence, there exists a need for local plans such as this, to more effectively and quickly respond to major emergencies in a specific community, and the Methow Valley plan is designed to do this. As such, this plan is intended to work in conjunction with local plans to help local governments respond to major events, thereby requiring these governments to officially adopt this plan. All efforts, including both the plan and the response, of the local emergency planning committee need to be in concert and coordination with both first responders (EMS, Fire, and Law), as well as local governing authorities.

All of those that have joined in this effort, from inception, final plan, to continual development, are to be congratulated and commended for their efforts. The Methow Valley is an even better place to live, work, and recreate as a result. The people of the valley can rest assured that in addition to their highly trained and experienced first responders, a plan exists that enables the organization, resources, and coordination of management to respond to any emergency that should arise.

Okanogan County Department of Emergency Management (DEM) wishes to thank the fine people of the Methow Valley for their efforts and example in creating this plan. By taking the time and effort to prepare for future emergencies, the citizens of the Methow Valley are helping the DEM to do its job. As such, the DEM stands ready to assist the Methow Valley in any way it can, both in future planning, as well as assisting in the management of any emergencies.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

AIMS

- 1) To provide effective, timely, and coordinated response to major emergencies in the Methow Valley, which exceed the normal response capabilities of first responders and local agencies.
- 2) To enable and activate community support, self-help, and participation when faced with a major emergency situation.

OBJECTIVES

- 1) Identify hazards and possible mitigation measures.
- 2) Identity possible scenarios and prepare basic response plans for those scenarios.
- 3) Identify resources and key contacts in the community; maintaining by updating annually.
- 4) Identify critical communications framework, including redundant communications paths.
- 5) Address the special needs population, and provide a means by which they can self-identify, respecting their privacy, and establish plans for meeting their needs during an emergency.
- 6) Create a plan that will be acceptable to local and county jurisdictions, and obtain their adoption.
- 7) Establish an ongoing committee for the purpose of developing, maintaining, and updating, the plan annually.
- 8) Seek acceptance, cooperation, and participation of all people and organizations in the Methow Valley, including first responders, local and county government, public and private organizations, and local citizens, through continued public meetings over time.
- 9) Continually and consistently educate people in the valley, using available opportunities and agencies, about emergency preparedness, response, and the Methow Valley emergency plan.

Exercise and test this plan on an annual basis, including communications.



Evacuation

IMPACT

- Can be specific area or entire valley
- Road congestion
- Lack of fuel and supplies
- Limited evacuation routes

Considerations for declaring evacuation:

- What are the wind and weather conditions?
- What time of day or night is it?
- Are conditions deteriorating or improving?
- Are people safer indoors or outdoors?
- Will the rapid movement of hundreds or thousands of people injury as many or more than the threat?
- Will the out flow of people obstruct the movement of emergency vehicles and responders?
- Will backed-up traffic cause congestion and/or block vital roadways?
- Is there a safe mode of transportation and route for evacuees?
- Is there sufficient notification time before the need to evacuate?
- Are there safe locations for staging areas, pickup points, shelter, supplies and medical assistance, if needed?
- Does the impacted group have special needs?



EVACUATION ROUTES


When community evacuations become necessary, local officials, working in conjunction with first responders, to maintain a flexible evacuation plan based on the situations that may impact resident, will provide information to the public through the media and/or door-to-door notification or street-by-street public address systems (i.e., fire truck with PA system). There are no specific evacuations routes for each type of hazard due to the extreme variability of Methow Valley's hazards. There are many factors that influence how each storm develops, floods flow, fires move, and chemical plumes expand.

The amount of time an individual might have to prepare for evacuation will depend on the hazard. If the event is a weather condition, such as a flood that can be monitored, you might have a day or two to get ready. However, many disasters allow no time for people to gather even the most basic necessities, which is why planning ahead, is essential.

These variable factors are considered before an evacuation is ordered. If it is too dangerous to evacuate, officials may decide it is safer to take protective actions, such as shelter in place, until it is safe to evacuate or the emergency is over. Once the decision is made to evacuate, the route and type of evacuation will vary depending on the scene. Key elements in these important decisions are covered in Risk Analysis.

When an evacuation is recommended by local officials it is a serious situation! Officials try to give as much advanced warning as possible, so the problem may not look serious at the time of notification. We need to educate residents to please evacuate immediately when asked to because they could lose their life if they stay. If residents wait, rescuers may not be able to reach you in time when the dangerous situation becomes worse.

This Methow Valley Evacuation Plan is a guide for residents if or when the need arises for an evacuation of the Valley. The map below indicates that Hwy 20 and Hwy 153 (North and South) are the primary evacuation routes. Weather and season allowing, escape going North through the USFS is also possible.



OKANOGAN COUNTY EVACUATION PROTOCOLS

LEVEL 1-

Evacuation Level 1, **ALERT** - residents are warned that current or projected threats from hazards associated with the approaching fire(s)/flood(s) are severe. You should monitor local media outlets or Okanogan County Department of Emergency Management's FACEBOOK page for up-to-date information. This is the time for preparation, and precautionary movement of persons with special needs, mobile property, and pets and livestock. If conditions worsen, we will make every attempt to contact you; however, **this may be the only notice that you receive.** Be aware of your surroundings and take appropriate actions.

LEVEL 2 -

Evacuation Level 2, **BE READY** - conditions indicated a good probability that hazards associated with the approaching fire(s)/flood(s) will severely limit our ability to provide emergency service protection. **YOU MUST BE PREPARED TO LEAVE AT MOMENTS NOTICE**. **THIS MAY BE THE ONLY NOTICE THAT YOU RECEIVE**. You should monitor local media outlets or Okanogan County Department of Emergency Management's FACEBOOK page for up-to-date information. **Be aware of your surroundings and take appropriate actions.** If conditions worse, we will make every attempt to contact you. If you are absent from your home for more than a short period of time, please leave a note with your name and contact telephone in a visible location.

LEVEL 3 –

Evacuation Level 3, **IMMEDIATE EVACUATION** – current conditions present specific and immediate threat(s) to the life and safety of persons within this area. Conditions indicate that the hazards associated with the incident will severely limit our ability to provide emergency service protection. You should monitor local media outlets or Okanogan County Department of Emergency Management's FACEBOOK page for up-to-date information.


If you choose to ignore this advisement, you must understand that emergency services may not be available. Volunteers will not be allowed to enter the area to help. Residents will not be allowed to return until conditions are safe.

Notification – The Incident Commander or designee will order an evacuation based on current conditions and recommendations from emergency response personnel. An evacuation would occur only if there is significant and credible information from reliable sources indicating that there is imminent danger.
